It's about Connections...




To our past... From Archaeological sites to Indian trails,

The Burnham Greenway Gap



The completion of the two-mile gap in the Burnham Greenway creates a key trail juncture serving five regional trails and closes a challenging gap in the 500 mile Grand Illinois Trail.

The Calumet-Sag Trail will also connect to the Pennsy Greenway through the Burnham Greenway.

The trail will bring riders to Chicago when linked to the **Last Four Miles** of the Lakefront Trail.



What additional health and recreation opportunities should residents have?



The development of trails (Connecting Places to Places) can provide this quality of life.



These linear parks strengthen local economies, restore and protect natural and historical legacies and improve people's lives – a triple bottom line of advantages for the Calumet region.



Its rich connectivity to towns and resources will make the Calumet-Sag Corridor a viable and popular east-west non-motorized connection for more than 200,000 residents living within two miles of the trail.

It serves seven village downtowns and their residents by linking schools, employers, and merchants directly thus encouraging healthy lifestyles and locally based economic development.



The development of a green corridor which preserves and creates open space gives a direct connection to 14 suburban communities with four county forest preserves and additional natural areas, to train stations along six suburban commuter rail lines, two colleges, and 400 miles of additional recreational trails.

The Trail will help preserve and enhance the historical treasures of the Calumet-Sag and its communities while strengthening regional identity and pride.


